

Chapter #15: Does Alaska's Judicial Corruption Implicate Robert Sheldon?

In 2010 evidence surfaced indicating that Marla Greenstein, the Alaska Commission on Judicial Conduct's only judge investigator, is falsifying investigations to keep corrupt judges on the bench and ruling over We-The-People. Superior Court Judge Stephanie Joannides certified the evidence of Ms. Greenstein's corruption and sent it individually to all nine members of the ACJC - including to Robert Sheldon, who continues to be an ACJC member to this day. The ACJC did nothing and when witnesses to Ms. Greenstein's corruption wished to testify to the ACJC, it ruled the witnesses would not be allowed to do so, despite ACJC written rules encouraging public testimony on anything that concerns the ACJC.

In 2022 a Kenai Grand Jury investigated Ms. Greenstein and those implicated in covering up. When the Grand Jury subpoenaed Ms. Greenstein to testify, she lawyered up and refused to do so.

After investigating, the Kenai Grand Jury wrote a report and recommendation to the public on what it found. However, Alaska's judges sealed the report and recommendation before the public could see it - even though the Grand Jury's independent counsel confirmed they were to be made public and even though our Constitution states the power of Grand Juries to make recommendations shall never be suspended.

Several Alaska Republican Party districts recently passed resolutions calling for the release of the report and recommendation, for the repeal of SCO 1993/Criminal Rule 6.1, and for the Governor to appoint an independent "Mollen" type commission to investigate in public. This led to a proposed statewide resolution (**attached**) during the May 7-9, 2026 ARP convention. When the resolution was brought up for discussion and vote, those present stated that an agitated and emotional Robert Sheldon argued against it, resulting in postponement of discussion and vote until the December 2026 State Central Committee meeting.

Conclusion

For two years the Kenai Grand Jury investigated corruption in Alaska's judicial system and the ACJC. Now the ACJC's longest serving member (Robert Sheldon - 17 years and counting) is trying to stop a resolution aimed at releasing the results of this investigation. And he claims Ms. Greenstein is training him to take her place as Alaska's only judge investigator. There are allegations that Alaska's judges corruptly sided with Mr. Sheldon in the bitter legal dispute he had with his sister Holly over a lucrative air taxi and luxury chalet operation on the side of Mount McKinley inside the heart of Denali National Park. Holly Sheldon claims that her own highly paid private attorneys sold her out and conspired with Robert Sheldon's attorneys and the judges to

corruptly take her inheritance. The Kenai Grand Jury also investigated whether or not private attorneys were turning on their own clients.

Can We-The-People allow long-time ACJC member Robert Sheldon to derail a resolution aimed at releasing a Grand Jury report and recommendation on whether or not the ACJC is corrupt? Can We-The-People allow Robert Sheldon to be Alaska's only judge investigator, possibly for the next 37 years? (Ms. Greenstein has held this position for 37 years; 8000 plus judge investigations so far) Do you agree the proposed statewide resolution should be passed as originally written? Do you think all Alaskan organizations and entities, both political and nonpolitical, should pass the same resolution?

New York City's 1994 Mollen Commission (appointed by Mayor Dinkins to publicly investigate):

"To cover up their corruption, officers created even more: they falsified official reports and perjured themselves to conceal their misdeeds. In the face of this problem, the Department allowed its systems for fighting corruption virtually to collapse. It had become more concerned about the bad publicity that corruption disclosures generate than the devastating consequences of corruption itself. As a result, its corruption controls minimized, ignored and at times concealed corruption rather than rooting it out. Such an institutional reluctance to uncover corruption is not surprising. No institution wants its reputation tainted – especially a Department that needs the public's confidence and partnership to be effective. Since no entity outside the Department was responsible for reviewing the Department's success in policing itself, years of self-protection continued unabated until this Commission commenced its independent inquiries."

A growing number of good, strong, and true Alaskans are determined to figure out exactly what is going on. Our first action will be a peaceful sit-in at noon on December 11, 2026 (just after new Governor takes office) in Anchorage's Atwood Building (Governor's office), until the new Governor appoints an independent "*Mollen*" type commission to publicly investigate. And pledges to take all action necessary to make public the Kenai Grand Jury report on corruption in Alaska's judicial system.
